### Cassidy Huber

After graduating from Lincoln High School, Cassidy continued her education at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, where she graduated in December 2022 with a Bachelor of Science in Kinesiology with a physical education (PE) teaching emphasis. "I gained leadership and



communication skills through my time as a youth ambassador," shares Cassidy.

Cassidy was able to apply these leadership skills throughout her college career where she led the SHAPE club, a professional development club for students studying PE. She also volunteered with PRIDE events, one of which was a gym class designed for students with disabilities. She has also been involved with the

community by coaching middle school basketball and high school softball and volunteering at the annual Alma Center Strawberry Festival.

This past school year, Cassidy served as a long-term substitute teacher at Colby Middle School and recently accepted a full-time position as their middle school physical education and health teacher. She cites her involvement in the youth ambassador program as nothing but positive. "I would highly recommend it to high school students looking for unique opportunities," she concludes.

#### Andrea Peterson


"I believe that my experience as a youth ambassador helped me gain confidence in my ability to speak with various individuals and prepared me for college," shares Andrea, a Black River Falls High School graduate.

Andrea's speaking skills will be key in her future career as a board-certified behavior analyst. Behavior analysts use various interventions to change individuals' behavior. She plans to work in a clinical setting, providing intervention techniques for young children with autism. "It is proven to be a very effective therapy to help children with autism prepare for school and gain independence," Andrea explains.



Following high school, Andrea continued her education at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire where she graduated in 2022 with a bachelor's degree in psychology. She is currently enrolled in the master's program for Applied Behavior Analysis at St. Cloud University. "I am currently a graduate assistant and lead the research for a professor," says Andrea.

The youth ambassador program teaches leadership skills such as teamwork. Andrea applied this skill during her participation on an intramural soccer team in college and recalls her positive team experience volunteering during the program: "Having a group that you work with to make the community better was an amazing experience, and I met so many fun people while doing so."



#### Abe Severson

A Black River Falls High School graduate, Abe Severson completed his first semester of college as a business student at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls where he quickly learned that a business degree wasn't his passion. "I transferred to the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire to pursue my degree in physical education," Abe shares.

Abe fulfilled his goal

and currently teaches physical education. Since the youth ambassador program, he has taken on additional leadership roles in his endeavors. He was an officer of the Society of Health and Physical Education Club at UWEC for two years. "I was a member of the wellness committee for the School District of New Richmond," says Abe. "We planned several community outreach events, one being a walk for mental health."

We hear from many past youth ambassadors that participation in the program helps build confidence. "My experience as a youth ambassador helped me build confidence and showed me the benefits of joining professional organizations that help my community," Abe says. "I'm happy to announce that I am moving back to my hometown to teach physical education at the Black River Falls High School."

#### Mary (Hinchcliff) Rogers

"I decided on my future career during my sophomore year of high school," shares Mary Rogers, a graduate of Lincoln High School. "I was able to take courses for college credit that applied to the surgical tech program requirements."

After graduation, Mary accepted a position at Black River Memorial Hospital (BRMH) as a patient care tech while completing the surgical technician program through Chippewa Valley Technical College. She graduated from the program in 2020 and was interested in staying at BRMH. "I accepted a surgical technician position at BRMH just a few months after graduation," she says.

After getting settled into her new career, Mary bought a house in 2021 and married her high school sweetheart. In 2022, she became a mother of twin boys. Looking back, she says that the youth ambassador program made her confident in her life decisions and ability to take on leadership roles. "I may have switched positions/departments at work, but I am always willing to take initiative and help anywhere I'm needed within BRMH," she concludes. "I am always willing to serve others outside of work, as well."

### Madison "Maddy" Shramek

Maddy Shramek began her college career at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse studying biology with a pre-dental track after graduating from Lincoln High School. "I changed my major to Public Health and Community Health Education during my sophomore year," Maddy says. "I decided to pursue nursing following completion of my undergraduate degree in 2022."

After graduating from UW-L, Maddy enrolled in Viterbo University's nursing program to obtain a Master of Science in Nursing. She is set to graduate from the program in May 2024. "Following graduation, I plan to work in a rural hospital to gain experience as a nurse and give back to the surrounding rural communities," Maddy says.

## "SUNDAE" FUN-DAY AT LINCOLN ROAD DAIRY

Don't miss out on a moo-velous time at Jackson County's third annual Sundae on the Farm to be held on Sunday, July 9, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Nathan and Karen Kling's Lincoln Road Dairy. "We've hosted the dairy breakfast in the past," says Nate. "We believe it's important to showcase dairy farming and promote our products."

Nate has been farming on his own since 1999 and purchased this farm in 2018. His home farm is farmed organically, and the Lincoln Road Dairy is farmed conventionally. The Klings milk about 255 cows and farm approximately 1,700 acres of corn, alfalfa, and hay mix. All of the work is done by Nate, Karen, their three children, and eight employees. "A unique feature on this farm is the robotic milking system," says Nate. "Guests will be able to see this operation during the event."

Sundae on the Farm is a free, family-fun event featuring grilled cheese sandwiches, ice cream sundaes, milk, and cheese curds. Nate hopes for nice weather, a good turnout,




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
