EFFECTIVE MAY 1, 2019:

Jackson Electric Billing Dates and Payment Deadline Change

Beginning with the May 2019 billing statement (April's usage), billing dates will be as follows:

1st day of the month: All meters will be read.

6th day of the month: Jackson Electric bills will be mailed. These are mailed from the bill processing center in St. Louis, MO.

10th day of the month: Delinquent accounts (from the previous month) become subject to disconnect at the close of business.

11th day of the month: Delinquent accounts (from the previous month) will be disconnected.

24th day of the month: Due date for bill payment. Automatic recurring bank draft and credit/debit card payment transactions occur.

25th day of the month: Late fees will be applied to delinquent accounts. Late fee is \$25 or 1.5 percent, whichever is greater.

If the above dates fall on a weekend or cooperative-recognized holiday, they will be moved to the next business day.

PORTABLE ELECTRIC SPACE HEATERS

Uncertainty of winter temperatures is part of living in Wisconsin. Because February has the potential to be a cold month, some of you may be thinking of using a portable electric space heater to warm your home.

Even though electric space heaters are 100 percent efficient, they still use a significant amount of electricity. Electric space heaters will increase your electric bill if used regularly. If you must, use an electric space heater for supplemental heat in a small area. They are not designed to heat your entire home.

A watt is a watt. A 1,500-watt milk house heater will generate the same amount of heat as a 1,500-watt infrared heater with a decorative cabinet.

PURCHASE FOR ENERGY EFFICIENCY Get a Rebate

Jackson Electric offers rebates to members who purchase qualified energy efficient equipment and lighting. Qualified items must be purchased, installed, and operating (generating kWhs) on Jackson Electric's service lines in 2019. To receive your rebate, contact our office for an application form or go to www. jackelec.com to download a form. Please submit to our office your completed and signed rebate application within 60 days of your invoice date with the Energy Star label (if applicable) and paid receipt. Your rebate application may be rejected if all required documentation is not received.

Audit Recommended Improvements

Incentives are available for energy efficiency improvements completed to an existing home or farm. Energy efficiency improvements must be recommendations from an audit arranged by Jackson Electric Cooperative or a cooperative-approved partner. Rebate not to exceed 20 percent of the cost of energy efficiency improvements up to \$500. For specific details on this program, go to www.jackelec.com or contact our office.

INTERFAITH:

Volunteers using their strengths to meet a community's needs

Tou've considered volunteering, but you're not sure where to start or who to contact. You may even be feeling some uncertainty. How much time will I have to commit? Is there flexibility? Do I really have something to contribute? One thing is certain: Everyone has at least one special talent that can be shared with others. What if there were an organization that could help you recognize your special talent and match it with a need in our community? Volunteering with Jackson County Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers may be the opportunity you've been looking for. Whether you're a snowbird or a year-round resident, there's an opportunity to volunteer an hour a day, week, month, or year. With Interfaith, there truly is an opportunity for all talents and schedules.

"Interfaith has a heart-warming, family atmosphere," describes Jackson County Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers Director Lori Chown. "We help people help others."

Helping people help others. That was the goal of a group of community members in 1987. Their mission was to create a faith-based outreach program to assist the elderly and disabled in Jackson County. They wanted to develop a way to keep Jackson County

residents in their homes longer, instead of moving them to assisted living or care centers. These individuals recognized the strengths of the population they wished to serve. These residents were capable of living at home—they just needed someone to help with light housework, provide transportation, or offer companionship.

By 1989, Jackson County Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers was formed. Many of the organization's programs were developed under the leadership of Karen Foust, former director of 28 years. This tight-knit, community-based organization's programs touch the lives of Jackson County residents of all ages by providing volunteers and partners with the opportunity to use their assets, their strengths, to help others.

Interfaith has a variety of volunteer opportunities, whether it's through one of the organization's ongoing programs, a volunteer/care receiver match, or a fundraising event. "Whatever your interest or availability, there is something you can do as an Interfaith volunteer," says Lori. "Currently, our greatest need is transportation." Area residents need someone to transport them to the grocery store, appointments, and to run errands. Transportation volunteers are especially needed in the areas outside of Black River Falls. Volunteers meet the care receiver at the door, assist them into the vehicle, and offer companionship.

"Interfaith volunteers offer more than just a car ride," adds Lori. "They offer a caring companion that helps them with their shopping or gets them to their appointments safely."

Many Interfaith-coordinated programs use the community's assets by partnering with local agencies to provide services. "We want to work with other organizations, not compete with them," ex-



plains Lori. If you're unable to provide transportation, there are other ways that you can serve. Maybe you like to read. Interfaith's Visually Impaired Program (VIP) seeks volunteers to create digital recordings of the *Banner Journal*, in addition to other publications. This opportunity is more flexible, as you can record the readings on your own time. You just need to pick up and return the recording device to Interfaith's office.

If you're available during the day and are comfortable working with schoolaged children, you may be interested in the Jackson United Mentoring Program (JUMP). This program matches mentors with a student. The mentor meets with the student in the school setting for one hour per week, usually during lunchtime, and serves as a positive role model for that student. Interfaith works with area school districts to coordinate nearly 20 volunteers for the program.

Do you a have a knack for arts and crafts or play an instrument? On Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, the Time for You Program provides stimulating games, music, crafts, and other activities for those experiencing memory loss, while providing a few hours of respite for caregivers. If you're not available for Time for You, maybe you can volunteer for the Groceries to Go program on Wednesdays. Groceries to Go delivers groceries to homebound individuals. The program has a partnership with Hansen's IGA. Volunteers pick up the groceries at Hansen's, deliver them to the participants, collect payment for the groceries, and return the payment to Hansen's.

Interfaith also has volunteer opportunities for those who may not be able to commit to specific hours. The Your Library to Go program combines friendly visits with delivery of library books to homebound individuals. This program has no set hours and could be coordinated with your schedule. Volunteer/care receiver matches could also be flexible with work schedules. For example, yard work, light meal preparation, and companionship are activities that don't necessarily have a set schedule. Additionally, you can donate resources instead of time. Interfaith accepts donated items for ages birth to 12 months to be used for the Bear Essentials program. Bear Essentials provides families in need with essential items, such as diapers and wipes.

The organization's fundraisers are also a great opportunity to volunteer or participate as a community member. "We have a golf outing every year in June," shares Lori. "You can support Interfaith by volunteering or golfing." Interfaith also has a bake sale, raffle, and a baking contest at the Black River Falls Oktoberfest celebration. The baked goods entered into the contest are judged by local royalty before being auctioned off.

"We appreciate all volunteers, whether it's one hour per week or one hour per month," says Lori. The organization currently has over 200 volunteers, adding at least 10 new volunteers each year. If you're interested in using your strengths to make a difference with Interfaith, you can call or stop in at their office. An application, references, and background check are required for the safety of other volunteers and the care receivers. Once accepted, Interfaith will organize an orientation with the new volunteer. Volunteers are typically 18 years of age and over. However, youth groups are welcomed with adult supervision.

"When you start volunteering," shares Lori, "you think you're helping others, but you end up helping yourself."—*Brandi Shramek*, *Executive Coordinator*
